Extensions:

There are many other complimentary activities that are available. Explore the clothing of the 18th Century, read the poem The Midnight Ride of Paul Revere by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow using Christopher Bing's illustrations, listen to popular music of the time, learn about William Diamond's drum and the history of Yankee Doodle, and read about the role of women during the Revolutionary War. All of these extensions lend themselves to integrating the lesson across the curriculum.
